#### THE BIDWELL PARK VOLUNTEER PROGRAM

The Bidwell Park Volunteer Program is part of the City of Chico Parks Division. Volunteer activities focus on weed management, restoration with native plants, litter removal, trail repair and maintenance, and some specialized construction projects. The Park Division runs weekly volunteer sessions at various Bidwell Park locations throughout the year and several large annual workdays, such as Earth Day in Bidwell Park on April 20, 2013 and Make a Difference Day in Bidwell Park on October 26, 2013. #### Clean Creeks in the Classroom

Clean Creeks in the Classroom partners with Kids & Creeks to provide valuable water quality protection education for 3rd-5th public school students. The program is designed to instill awareness of Best Management Practices (BMPs) for the prevention of runoff pollution of waterways. Participating students experience hands-on watershed model demonstrations and a field trip to a local park. Students, parents and teachers learn about the riparian habitat and the impacts that we have on our local waterways. They learn how to protect water quality by using simple good housekeeping and landscaping/gardening habits to prevent pollutants from entering our creeks through our gutters and storm drains. 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## Recycle Your E-Waste

- E-Waste refers to electronic products such as computers, cell phones, TVs, stereos, VCRs and DVD players that are at the end of their "useful life".
- E-Waste products contain toxic substances such as lead, mercury, cadmium, and lithium.
- If not properly disposed of, the hazardous wastes from these products can leach into our ground water and local waterways.
- E-Waste should be refurbished, if possible, or taken to a facility or business in which it can be recycled or disposed of properly.

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#### Litter / Cigarette Butts If it isn't rainwater, it doesn't belong in the gutter!

- Before you allow anything to go into the gutter or storm drain, stop and think. Storm drains do not go to the sewer, they flow directly into channels and creeks, through wetlands and to the ocean.
- If you smoke, please use ashtrays to dispose of your cigarette butts. Cigarette butts littered on the streets wash directly into our creeks where the toxic chemicals that are trapped in the filter leak into waterways, threatening the quality of the water and many aquatic life forms. With trillions of butts littered every year, the toxic chemicals add up!
- Pet waste pollutes our creeks. Please clean up after your pet! Dispose of the waste in a bag and dump it in the garbage.
- Bring your own reusable shopping bags when you shop to cut down on the plastic bags in our waterways.

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## Hire a Clean Water Business Partner

- If you're looking to clean your carpets, install new landscaping, or make general home improvements, consider using the services of a Clean Water Business Partner (CWBP) to ensure that your project will not contribute to urban runoff pollution.
- Each CWBP has made a personal pledge to educate their customers, and help keep Chico's creeks clean by employing best management practices (BMPs) which prevent runoff pollution during their daily business operations. These businesses use safer products and/or BMPs to prevent fertilizers, pesticides, chemical wastewater, paint products, and general construction debris and byproducts from being dumped, washed or broomed into our gutters and storm drains.

#### Use Water Wisely. It's Essential.

- When it comes to water, nature is the ultimate recycler. The water from your garden hose may go on to help form a rain cloud or seep into the ground to feed a nearby well. Over the course of time, it may end up back in your garden hose, ready to start the whole process over again.
- Here are a few tips to help save water outdoors:
   Use a broom instead of a hose to clean paved areas.

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Turn off your sprinklers when it rains or install a weather-based controller.

Adjust sprinklers to avoid watering the sidewalk.

If you use a hose to wash your car, use a shut-off hose nozzle, or even better, a bucket of water.

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## **Watershed-friendly Gardening**

- The misuse and misapplications of fertilizers, pesticides and herbicides can pollute our water and cause obvious harm to plants and animal life found in Chico creeks. An excessive build-up and accumulation of vegetation waste (green waste) can result in nutrient loading which depletes oxygen levels and kills off native aquatic wildlife.
- Limit the amount of fertilizer you use on your lawn or garden and don't fertilize when rain is forecast.
- If you must use pesticides or herbicides, never use them in wet weather and choose organic products whenever possible.
   Use Integrated Pest Management (IPM) rather than pesticides. (Learn more at www.ipm.ucdavis.edu)
- Never dump green waste in gutters, storm drains, waterways, or along creeks or stream banks. Recycle all of your green
  waste by placing it in your green waste garbage can or take it to the North Valley Organic Waste facility (See back of calendar for location and hours).

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## Watershed-friendly Cleaning Methods

- Use vegetable-based soaps and household cleaners that are watershed-friendly.
- Make your own homemade cleaning products with ingredients such as distilled white vinegar, vegetable-based liquid soap, baking soda and tea tree oil. See back of calendar for more watershed-friendly cleaning information.
- Choose commercial cleaning products that do not contain phosphates.
- Send dirty cleaning water down a toilet or sink drain instead of a gutter or storm drain.
- Take unused cleaning products to the Butte County Household Hazardous Waste Facility (See back of calendar for location and hours). Never dispose of unused cleaning products by throwing in the trash, pouring down sink drains, or dumping on the ground or down storm drains.

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# Watershed-friendly Car Washing

- Automotive fluids, such as oils, greases and solvents, are hydrocarbon based and may contain metals, chlorinated hydrocarbons, and
  other toxic compounds. The process of car washing can release these toxic compounds along with caked-on dirt, grime and harmful
  detergents, into our waterways via the storm drain system.
- Here's how you can help keep Chico's creeks clean and healthy:

If you wash your car at home, wash it on your lawn or gravel area where waste water can soak into the ground way from drainage areas; And use an automatic shut-off pressurized nozzle to conserve water and to minimize runoff;

And do not use acid based wheel cleaners or engine degreasers;

If you use soap, use vegetable-based or citrus-based soaps and follow the directions carefully.

Or take your car to an automatic car wash that uses a closed loop washing system.

Or wash your car at a self-service coin-operation car wash.

If you are a charity car wash fundraiser group, the City of Chico Sanitary Sewer & Storm Drain Section can provide information and tools to help ensure your car wash event complies with regulations and is safe for Chico creeks. ## **CFL** Recycling

- Compact Fluorescent Light bulbs (CFLs) use far less energy than standard incandescent light bulbs. However, CFLs contain mercury and must be recycled.
- Follow these steps when using CFLs:

Take care when changing bulbs.

If a bulb breaks, open window and leave room for 15 minutes. Using a piece of stiff cardboard, gently scoop debris fragments into a plastic bag and seal.

If a bulb breaks on carpet, use sticky tape to first pick up small pieces and powder and then vacuum. Put vacuum bag in sealed plastic bag.

Dispose of all burned-out CFL bulbs and any CFL clean-up sealed plastic bags at CFL recycling centers.

#### Sanitary Sewer System

The City of Chico's Sanitary Sewer System facilities include 227 miles of gravity sewer pipelines, four miles of force mains, and 13 lift pump stations. The City regularly schedules preventative maintenance tasks on all facilities in order to prevent Sanitary Sewer Overflows (SSO) that may occur from root intrusion, clogs in the sewer from improper items flushed, and Fats Oils and Grease (FOG) buildup.

City of Chico Wastewater System

Small diameter pipes or laterals connect homes or business' to the City's Sanitary Sewer System main pipelines. Maintenance of the laterals are the responsibility of the property owner.

#### Water Pollution Control Plant (WPCP)

The final destination for the City's wastewater is located four miles southwest of downtown at the Water Pollution Control Plant (WPCP). The WPCP is capable of treating up to 12 Million Gallons of wastewater per Day (MGD) through a physical and chemical process utilizing both anaerobic and aerobic bacteria in order to meet discharge limitations that are set for the WPCP by a National Pollution Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit, which allows the City to discharge the treated effluent to the Sacramento River.

By safely collecting, transporting, and adequately treating Chico's wastewater, the City of Chico helps to protect the public health and the environment.

## Home Improvement

- When cleaning your tools, never rinse or dump paint products, cleaning solvents, or cement based products in gutters or down storm drains.
- Use latex-based, low VOC paints whenever possible. When using paint thinner to clean oil-based paint products from tools, collect the fluid residue in a container and strain the paint particulates from the paint thinner which can then be reused.
- Offer to let your carpet cleaner empty the waste water onto your lawn or down your toilet.
   Sweep sidewalks and driveways clean and dispose of debris into the trash can rather than hosing sidewalks down.
- Take unused paints, solvents, adhesives and other household chemicals and toxics to the Butte County Household Hazardous Waste Facility (see back of calendar for location and hours).
- Choose a Clean Water Business Partner to clean your carpets, landscape your yard, paint your house, detail your automobiles and provide General Contractor remodeling services. See back of calendar for list. Visit www.keepchicoclean.org for current CWBP list.

## **Auto Care & Repair**

- Never dump auto fluids down storm drains or other areas.
- Used oil from a single oil change can pollute up to one million gallons of freshwater.
- Recycle used oil and antifreeze by taking them to service stations or recycling centers (visit www.earth911.com for locations) or take to the Butte County Household Hazardous Waste Facility (see back of calendar for location and hours).
- Dispose of unused or spent cleaning solvents at the Butte County Household Hazardous Waste Facility (see back of calendar for location and hours).
- Use a funnel when pouring liquids (motor oil and anti-freeze) and place a tray underneath your vehicle to catch spills.

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
